9 ANNCR:	(ON ECHO) Signal Oil Companymarketers of the famous
10	Signal go-farther gasoline invites you to sit back
11	and enjoy another strange story by "The Whistler."
12 MUSIC:	(WHISTLE ON FULL ECHODIMINISH ECHO TO CLEAR AND
13	SEGUE TO ORCHESTRA UP TO CLIMAX, REC #1 CUT #2)
14 WHISTLER:	I am the Whistler
15	(SNEAK IN ORCHESTRA THEME AND CARRY UNDER FOLLOING:)
16	And I know many things, for I walk by night. I know
17	many strange tales hidden in the hearts of men and
18	women who have stepped into the shadows. Yes, I know
19	the nameless terrors of which they dare not speak.
20 MUSIC:	(THEME AND TYMP-BRIDGE)
21 ANNCR:	And now, for the Signal Oil Company, the Whistler's
22	strange story "Look In The Window".
23 MUSIC:	UP TO B.G.

1	WHISTLER:	The crowded courtroom was tense. The spectators
2		leaning forward for a better look at the accused. It
3		appeared only a matter of time and the testimony of one
4		witnessthe man assaulted John O'Sullavanonly
5		a matter of time before the district attorney would
6		convince the jury that Charles Edmunds was guilty, not
7		only of burglary, but also of assault
8	CAST AND SOUND:	B.G. COURTROOM NOISES, MURMURING UNDER
9	D.A.:	(ANTICIPATE)and the state will prove that Charles
10		Edmunds plotted and planned this crime for at least six
11		months before hand! And ladies and gentlemen, it was
12		well planned. Edmunds would be a free man today
13		except for the unexpected appearance of John O'Sullavan
14		at the scene of the crime. And did O'Sullavan's
15		presence in any way deter Edmunds? It did not.
16		Charles Edmunds assaulted O'Sullavan with a deadly
17		weapon intent on killing him intent on seeing that
18		O'Sullavan never lived to testify against him!
19	MUSIC:	(IN AND UNDER) REC 8 CUT 3
20	WHISTLER:	You sit there listening, don't you, Charles, listening
21		and wondering how this could be happening to you. You
22		think back six months to the start of it to that
23		warm summer evening when you and your wife, Jean,
24		stepped out your front door for a breath of air
25	SOUND:	NIGHT NOISES CRICKETS ETC UNDER
26	JEAN:	Oh, it is lovely out tonight, isn't it, Charles.
27	CHARLES:	Um hmmmmm.

1 JEAN: So clear and bright.

2 CHARLES: (SHRUGS) That means we'll have another scorcher tomorrow.

3 Paper said it was over ninety today.

4 JEAN: I see Mr. Morton's still up.

5 CHARLES: Yeah -- living room light's on.

6 JEAN: Poor old man -- I feel so sorry for him. No friends --

7 CHARLES: He has us -- we always speak to him, don't we?

8 JEAN: I mean -- no relatives -- living all alone in that house.

9 CHARLES: Well, it's the way he wants it.

10 JEAN: I'd think he would want someone around -- someone close.

11 CHARLES: I noticed he hired a handy man - fellow named John

12 O'Sullavan. Guess he's getting too old to cut his own

lawn.

14 JEAN: Charles?!

15 CHARLES: Hmmm?

16 JEAN: Look over there -- in front of the window -- that shadow

17 --- it looks like a man -- see?

18 CHARLES: Shadow? Where?

19 JEAN: There -- right in front of Mr. Morton's living room

window.

21 CHARLES: Yeah. Yeah it is a man. A prowler -- looking in.

22 (BEAT) Let's take a walk over. Scare him away.

23 SOUND: START WALKING THEM, UNDER

24 JEAN: (LOW) What do you suppose he's up to?

25 CHARIES: (LOW) He'll see us anytime now -- just act casual.

26 Pretend you don't see him.

27 JEAN: There! He saw us! (THEY STOP) Look at him go,

28 Charles!

1 CHARLES: Yeah -- whoever he is, he can sure run.

2 JEAN: (NORMAL NOW) Do you think we should tell Mr. Morton?

3 CHARLES: (SHRUGS) No...why bother him.

4 JEAN: Well, it's getting late dear.

5 CHARLES: (SUDDEN THOUGHT) Wait a minute. I'd like to take a look

in that window. See what our friend was so interested

7 in.

8 JEAN: (REPROACHFUL) Charles!

9 CHARLES: Why not?....

10 SOUND: START THEM WALKING

11 CHARLES: We can just pass by this window easy like, and...

12 (THEY STOP)

13 JEAN: (LOW, REACTING) Charles!

14 CHARLES: Yeah! Look at it, Jean. Look at the money he has.

15 JEAN: Let's go.

16 CHARLES: Wait.

17 JEAN: He'll see us.

18 CHARLES: No. He can't see us from there. (BEAT) Look -- he's

19 finished counting it.

20 JEAN: (WORRIED) Please, Charles!

21 CHARLES: He's going toward the fireplace. That's where he must

22 hide it -- somewhere around the fireplace....

23 JEAN: I'm going home.

24 CHARLES: Look, Jean...that loose rock -- see he's taken it out.

25 He's putting the money behind it. Behind that loose

26 rock in the fireplace!

27 JEAN: Charles, please, I beg you!

1 CHARLES: All right...all right!

2 SOUND: THEY START WALKING UNDER

3 CHARLES: All that money! I wonder how much he has there?

4 JEAN: (BREATHLESS, TENSE) I... I wish we'd never seen it. I

5 wish we'd never seen it at all!

6 MUSIC: (IN AND UNDER) (REC 9 CUT 7)

7 WHISTLER: That was the start of it, wasn't it, Charles....though

8 the months passed swiftly, you never forgot all that

9 money hidden in your eccentric neighbor's fireplace.

And then one morning his gardener came over to use your

11 telephone.

12 JOHN: (VERY SLIGHT IRISH ACCENT) Sorry to be botherin' you so

early, Mr. Edmunds. But Mr. Morton is bad sick. I

thought you might let me call the doctor.

15 CHARLES: Of course, John...Come in.

16 SOUND: STEPS UNDER -- CLOSE DOOR

17 JOHN: Morning, Mrs. Edmunds.

18 JEAN: (OFF BIT) Good morning, John.

19 CHARLES: The phone's in the hall, John. Help yourself.

20 SOUND: HIS STEPS GO OFF

21 CHARLES: (LOW) Old man Morton's sick.

22 JEAN: Oh -- that's a shame.

23 CHARLES: Suppose he dies, Jean. Who'll get that money? Who

24 knows it's there -- in the fireplace -- but you and me?

25 JEAN: (BEAT) When he comes back from phoning, ask John to sit

down, (LEAVING) I'll heat some soup for him to take

27 back to Mr. Morton.

28 SOUND: BRING JOHN BACK ON

1	JOHN:	(COMING ON) The doctor's coming right out.
2	CHARLES:	Fine. Have some coffee, John. (SIT HIM DOWN) About
3		time old Mister Morton hired a good strong man to help
4		him out. How're you getting along with him anyway?
5	JOHN:	We get along. He's fair. Honest. Likes you folks,
6		too, you know.
7	CHARLES:	Yes, we're quite friendly. Careful man with money,
8		though, isn't he, John.
9	JOHN:	That he is. Doesn't even trust the banks. I understand
10		he keeps his savings hidden away in the house.
11	CHARLES:	Oh? That so.
12	JOHN:	Some folks say he's got 5,000 or 10,000 hidden away.
13	CHARLES:	Well, I wouldn't know anything about that, John. I
14		really wouldn't.
15	MUSIC:	(IN AND UNDER) REC 9 CUT 2
16	WHISTLER:	You wonder if John is passing on a rumor or if he was
17		the prowler you and Jean saw peering in the Morton
18		window. If he was he, too, knows for certain
19		there's money in that house. (PAUSE) You go downtown
20		to your office but your mind isn't on your work, is it
21		noYou keep thinking about old Mister Morton and the
22		money in the fireplace. Then when you return home
23		that evening
24	SOUND:	ANTICIPATE CAR UNDER FOR A MOMENT, THEN STOP IT AND OPEN
		DOOR.
25		TOOLS •
	JEAN:	(OFF - COMING ON - ON GRAVEL) Charles! Oh, Charles -

1 CHARLES: (OUT AND CLOSE CAR DOOR) What?

2 JEAN: Over there -- in front of the Morton house. See -- the

3 hearse -- it's just pulling away.

4 CHARLES: When did he...?

5 JEAN: This afternoon. The doctor said it was his heart.

6 CHARLES: Oh. (BEAT) Where's John?

7 JEAN: Why, I haven't seen him.

8 CHARLES: I'll bet he's in there trying to find the old man's

9 money.

10 JEAN: Charles! What an awful thing to say.

11 CHARLES: Is it? Wouldn't you like to be alone in that house for

a few minutes?

13 JEAN: Please. Charles -- Mr. Morton's lawyer, Mr. Daniels is

there. He's been there all afternoon. Now come inside.

The Millers are coming over -- they'll be here any

16 minute for early dinner.

17 MUSIC: (IN AND UNDER) REC 10 CUT 3

18 WHISTIER: Late that night, after your guests have departed -- you

lie awake staring at the ceiling. As the clock strikes

twelve, you slip from your bed, put on your robe,

21 leave the room. Minutes later, you've reached the back

porch of the old Mortons house.

23 SOUND: OUTDOOR NIGHT NOISES -- CRICKETS ETC -- WALK HIM

24 COUPLE STEPS ON WOOD -- TRY LOCKED DOOR

25 JEAN: (OFF, CALLS SOFTLY) Charles!

26 CHARIES: (TURNS, STARTLED) What?!

27 JEAN: (COMING ON) What are you up to? Have you lost your

28 mind?

1 CHARLES: Go home, Jean.

2 JEAN: It's stealing, Charles. Taking that money is stealing.

3 CHARLES: Stealing? From whom? It doesn't belong to anyone now.

4 JEAN: I don't care what you say -- it's wrong.

5 CHARIES: Jean -- I'm going in there whether you like it or not.

6 Now get out of my way!

7 MUSIC: (IN AND UNDER) REC 10 CUT 8

8 WHISTLER: You watch her leave then force the window. Soon you're

9 inside, at the fireplace, your hands groping for that

loose rock. You tremble as you discover it, slide it

from it's place...then...

12 CHARLES: Oh, no!....

13 SOUND: ROCK SLIDE BACK, THEN DROPPED ON FLOOR:

14 JOHN: (OFF: CALLING) Who's there?!

15 CHARLES: (REACTS)

16 SOUND: START HIS FOOTSTEPS COMING ON, SLOWLY

17 JOHN: (NERVOUS, COMING CLOSER) Look -- I saw your flashlight. -

now stand still -- and don't try anything. I'll just

19 turn on these lights, and....

20 SOUND: QUICK RUNNING FOOTSTEPS

21 JOHN: (REACT AS CHARLES GRABS HIM)

JOHN AND

22 CHARLES: (AD LIB STRUGGLE)

23 SOUND: STRUGGLE, FURNITURE OVERTURNED

1 WHISTLER	: (OVER SOUND) He's too powerful for you, isn't he,
2	CharlesYou feel yourself being forced backin
3	another moment he'll have you pinned to the floor,
4	then you break away, suddenly run to the fireplace
5	and grab a poker. As he comes at you again you lift
6	it swing it down hard.
7 MUSIC:	(POINT) REC 8 CUT 6
8 CHARLES:	(PANTING, THEN WITH EXERTION) Who? Who are you?
9	(BEAT) Flashlight. Get the flashlight. (COUPLE STEPS
10	STOP) (SOUND:CLICK OF FLASHLIGHT) Sureshoulda
11	knownJohn! John O'Sullavan!
12 MUSIC:	(CURTAIN) REC 2 CUT 7

OPENING COMMERCIAL

1 ANNCR:	Friends - based on reports from 18,000 garages that supply

3		did you It was going to be simple. Just a matter
4		of taking the money from the old Morton house and
5		walking home. But now everything is changed, isn't
6		it and looking down at the still form of John
7		O'Sullavan a wave of panic sweeps over you but you
8		fight it off, and your mind clears quickly you wipe
9		off all fingerprints from the poker, from everything
10		you've touched you slip the rock back in place,
11	•	gather up the money. In a few minutes you're standing
12		before your wife in your own home
13	JEAN:	Oh, Charles how could you do it? What's happened to
14		you?
15	CHARLES:	Look at it, Jean. Look at the money more than we've
16		ever had in all our lives. And you ask questions.
17	JEAN:	Take it back.
18	CHARLES:	No. I (HESITATES) I can't go back in there again.
19	JEAN:	Charles, what did you what happened over there?
50	CHARLES:	(SCARED) I couldn't help it, Jean. I didn't want to
21		hurt him but
22	JEAN:	Tell me what happened!
23	CHARLES:	John O'Sullavan was in there. It was dark I didn't
24		know who he was he came at me we fought I
25		(SIMPLY) I hit him with a poker from the fireplace.
26	JEAN:	Oh no!! Is he? Did you?
27	CHARLES:	No, No, he was alive when I left the house.
28	JEAN:	Thank heaven for that.
29	SOUND:	START HER WALKING UNDER

- 1 CHARLES: Where are you going?
- 2 JEAN: (SHE STOPS) (OFF) I'm going to call an ambulance.
- 3 CHARLES: (GOING TO HER) We can't do that, Jean. An ambulance
- means the sheriff. He'd ask questions.
- 5 JEAN: But you've got to help him, Charles. He needs a doctor.
- 6 You can't let him die.
- 7 CHARLES: I know. But what can I tell them, Jean? What'll I say?
- 8 JEAN: Tell them (SUDDEN) Charles! Charles, remember the
- 9 night we saw a prowler standing in front of the Morton
- living room window?
- 11 CHARLES: Yeah.
- 12 JEAN: Why couldn't that have been ... tonight?!
- 13 CHARLES: What?
- 14 JEAN: Tell them you saw a prowler over there -- that you
- grew suspicious and followed him.
- 16 CHARLES: (CONSIDERING) Yeah -- and I watched him go into the
- house -- heard them fighting and ran back here to call
- the sheriff's office. (REALIZING) There's only one
- thing wrong -- if John recognized me...
- 20 JEAN: Your -- your robe is torn. Did you know that?
- 21 CHARLES: Yeah... The pocket's ripped. But that could have
- 22 happened anywhere.
- 23 JEAN: Charles -- suppose John doesn't regain consciousness--
- suppose he dies...
- 25 CHARLES: Don't say that! Don't even think it!
- 26 JEAN: (BEAT) Go make your phone call, Charles.
- 27 MUSIC: (BRIEF BRIDGE, OUT INTO:) (REC 3 CUT 4)

- 1 SHERIFF: Now let's go over this again, Mr. Edmunds. You say the
- 2 first time you saw a prowler on the Morton grounds was
- 3 about six months ago?
- 4 CHARLES: That's right, sheriff.
- 5 SHERIFF: Were you ever close enough to distinguish his features?
- 6 Could you identify him?
- 7 CHARLES: No -- I'm afraid I couldn't. It was a dark night and...
- 8 JEAN: Sheriff, how is Mr. O'Sullavan? Have you heard?
- 9 SHERIFF: Not yet, Mrs. Edmunds.
- 10 CHARLES: What was he doing there, Sheriff?
- 11 SHERIFF: Mr. Daniels, Morton's lawyer asked O'Sullavan to stay
- in the house and keep an eye on things until the estate
- was settled.
- 14 CHARLES: Then he did have a right to be there?
- 15 SHERIFF: Oh, yes.
- 16 JEAN: I just can't imagine why anyone would want to kill Mr.
- 17 O'Sullavan.
- 18 SHERIFF: This wasn't an attempt to murder him, Mrs. Edmunds.
- 19 JEAN: No?
- 20 SHERIFF: This was robbery. Or attempted robbery. There was
- 21 several thousand dollars in cash in the house.
- 22 CHARLES: Oh, now sheriff, we've all heard rumors about old man
- 23 Morton and his money. Don't tell me there was any truth
- 2¹ to it.
- 25 SHERIFF: It isn't rumor according to Mr. Daniels. However,
- 26 (RISING) don't you folks get upset about this -- we'll
- continue our investigation and when O'Sullavan is able
- to talk most likely he can help clear it up.

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- 1 WHISTLER: You count the money then ... fondling it, caressingly ...
- find that it totals five thousand four hundred dollars.
- 3 You stuff it all into a glass jar, and while your wife
- 4 stands by watching you -- you bury it deep in the flower
- 5 garden. The clock is striking four when you finally get
- to bed -- you sleep fitfully for a few hours ...
- 7 SOUND: PHONE RINGING OFF
- 8 CHARLES: (GROANS) Oh -- I'll get it.
- 9 SOUND: (FOOTSTEPS ON WOOD, PHONE UP)
- 10 CHARLES: Hello..
- 11 SHERIFF: (FILTERED) 'Morning, Mr. Edmonds. This is Sheriff Sam
- 12 Wood *
- 13 CHARLES: Oh yes, sheriff.
- 14 SHERIFF: Say, I wondered if you'd mind meeting Mr. Daniels and
- me over at the Morton place. I want to take another
- 16 look around.
- 17 CHARLES: Why no, sheriff, I'd be glad to meet you. When?
- 18 SHERIFF: Oh, it's eight thirty now. Say in half an hour.
- 19 CHARLES: That will be fine.
- 20 MUSIC: (BRIEF BRIDGE) REC 3 CUT 7
- 21 SOUND: (THEIR FOOTSTEPS ON EARTH -- THEN STOP)
- 22 SHERIFF: I appreciate your promptness, Mr. Edmunds -- uh you say
- 23 this is about where you first saw the man looking in the
- 24 window?
- 25 CHARLES: Yes, sheriff. Right here.
- 26 DANIELS: What time was that?
- 27CHARLES: Uh -- a little after twelve, Mr. Daniels.
- 28DANTELS: Are you usually out at that late hour?

- 1 CHARLES: We had some guests over for the evening. They left about
- eleven thirty -- by the time we cleared the dishes --
- 3 put the card table away
- 4 DANIELS: Were the living room lights in the Morton house on at
- 5 that time?
- 6 CHARLES: (BEAT) Yes..yes, they were.
- 7 DANIELS: And you saw a man's silhouette framed against the lighted
- 8 window?
- 9 CHARLES: That's right.
- 10 SHERIFF: Uh, let's go around to the back of the house. Where the
- 11 prowler broke in. (SOUND: START THEM WALKING ON DIRT)
- 12 CHARLES: Whatever you say.
- 13 SHERIFF: Funny that fellow didn't leave any footprints. He must
- 14 have been wearing sneakers.
- 15 SOUND: STEPS STOP
- 16 DANIELS: Well, you can see where he forced this window. No doubt
- 17 about that.
- 18 SHERIFF: Let's go inside.
- 19 SOUND: WALK THEM UP WOOD STEPS, THEN THROUGH DOOR
- 20 DANTELS: You looked for fingerprints, didn't you sheriff?
- 21 SHERIFF: My men did. Didn't find anything that would help.
- 22 DANIELS: Too bad the old gentlemen was so cautious, he might have
- told me where that money was hidden.
- 24 SHERIFF: You used to talk to him every now and then didn't you,
- 25 Mr. Edmunds.
- 26 CHARLES: Yes--my wife too. But he never gave a hint of any money.
- 27 DANTELS: If he'd only believed he was dying. The doctor told him
- 28 he was -- but he didn't believe it. Like lots of people,

I guess.

- 1 SHERIFF: Who gets the house now that he's gone?
- 2 DANIELS: The state most likely, but it isn't much.
- 3 SHERIFF: (SIGHS) Sure are plenty of places to hide money in here.
- 4 (GRINS) Now if I was an old miser where would I hide my
- 5 money? Behind the pictures? Under the rug? Behind the
- 6 books? In a secret panel? The fireplace?

7 MUSIC: (POINT AND UNDER) REC 10 CUT 6

- 8 WHISTLER: Your eyes follow the sheriff's to the fireplace, don't
- 9 they Charles, and when you see the loose rock -- the
- 10 blood drains from your face. The rock is there -- in
- ll it's place but it stands out almost as if it had been
- painted with a luminous dye. For a moment you're too
- startled to think. Then you realize realize that
- 14 it must have happened when you lifted it back into place
- -- you put the face of the rock into the wall so that the
- side that is out, facing the room, is clean and bright --
- not discolored by smoke as are the other rocks around it.
- And in that instant, you raalize, too, that you must get
- 19 the sheriff and Daniels out of the living room.
- 20 CHARLES: Uh Sheriff..
- 21 SHERIFF: Yes?
- 22 CHARLES: (CASUALLY) Why do you assume he hid the money in here?
- 23 Why couldn't it be in some other room in the house?
- 24 SHERIFF: Could be, I suppose. What do you say, Daniels?
- 25 DANIELS: We-el, anythings's possible with a man like that.
- Want to take a look around?
- 27 CHARLES: To save time why don't we split up? Each of us take a
- 28 room. If we see anything unusual, we can call the others.

1DANIELS: Fine with me, Sheriff?

2SHERIFF: All right. You look in the den, Mr. Daniels. Mr.

3 Edmunds --

4CHARLES: If you'll take the bedroom, Sheriff, I'll give a look in

5 the kitchen.

6SHERIFF: (FADING) Good enough. Let's get started....

7MUSIC: (IN AND UNDER) REC 10 CUT 7

8WHISTLER: You start for the kitchen, don't you, Charles...stop and

9 listen until you hear Daniels and the sheriff moving

about in the other parts of the house...quickly you

ll hurry back to the living room fireplace, turn the

accusing rock around, hurry on into the kitchen as if

continuing your part of the search...you're calm,
